DIRECTION OF ELECTION AND REFERENDUM

Petitions having been filed with the Wisconsin Employment Relations Commission by Local 150, Service & Hospital Employees' International Union, AFL-CIO, requesting that an election to determine bargaining representative and a referendum on the "All-Union Agreement" question be conducted among certain employes of Draper & Kramer Incorporated of Wisconsin; and hearing on said petitions having been conducted at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on March 14, 1974, by Marshall L. Gratz, Hearing Officer; and the Commission having considered the record and being satisfied that questions have arisen concerning representation and an "All-Union Agreement" for certain employes of the Employer;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is

DIRECTED

That an election and referendum be conducted within thirty (30) days from the date of this Directive in the voting group consisting of "all regular full-time and regular part-time janitorial, gardening, lot attendant and elevator starter employes employed by Draper & Kramer Incorporated of Wisconsin at the M.G.I.C. Plaza, 250 - 270 Kilbourn Avenue, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, but excluding supervisors, department heads and all other employes" who were employed by the Employer on March 14, 1974, except such employes as may prior to the election and referendum quit their employment or be discharged for cause for the purpose of determining:

 Whether a majority of such employes voting desire to be represented for the purposes of collective bargaining by Local 150, Service & Hospital Employees' International Union, AFL-CIO; Whether a majority of the eligible employes favor an "All-Union Agreement" between Local 150, Service & Hospital Employees' International Union, AFL-CIO, and Draper & Kramer Incorporated of Wisconsin.

MEMORANDUM ACCOMPANYING DIRECTION OF ELECTION AND REFERENDUM

The petition as originally filed contained the following description of the claimed appropriate bargaining unit:

> "All of the employees of the employer employed at the M.G.I.C. Plaza as cleaning personnel, but excluding supervisors or department heads."

The Union amended its claimed unit description following informal discussions between the parties during the course of the hearing in this matter. After the Union so amended its petition, the Employer raised no further objections or concerns with regard to the appropriateness of the claimed unit.

The parties stipulated during the hearing to a list of employes eligible to vote. At the time it was agreed that a window washer hired prior to March 14 who was to start on March 15, 1974 would be eligible to vote. Her name, later supplied by the Employer, is Kathleen Slamka.

Later on the day of the hearing, but following the close thereof, the Hearing Officer was informed by the Employer that the names of six additional eligibles ought to be added to the agreed-upon list. Upon discussion by the Hearing Officer of that request with Mr. Owley of the Union, and thereafter with Mr. Bruggerman of the Employer, it was agreed that five of those proposed additional eligibles would be added to the agreed-upon list but that Patrick Peet, an employe hired prior to March 14 but expected to start on April 10, 1974, would not be eligible to vote.

In addition, in telephone conversations with the parties, the Hearing Officer learned that one additional name, that of Ida Osbourne, should be added to the agreed-upon eligibility list; Ms. Osbourne is a night janitorial employe who began working on March 14, 1974.

A copy of the stipulated eligibility list as amended is attached hereto.

The petition contained the following statement: "Petition to serve as a request for recognition". During the course of the hearing, the Union reaffirmed that request for voluntary recognition and offered to submit to a check of authorization cards gathered over some period of time. The Employer expressed a desire that a secret ballot election be held to determine the desires for representation of the employes.

Based upon the record herein, the Commission is satisfied that an election and referendum should be conducted within the claimed unit as amended.
